# **Butterfly Life Cycle**

### **Learning outcomes**

- »The sequential stages of life cycles are different for different animals. (Grade 2 Life Sciences)
- » Animals eat plants or other animals for food and may also use plants or even other animals for shelter and nesting. (Grade 1 – Life Sciences)
- » Organisms reproduce offspring of their own kind and that the offspring resemble their parents and one another. (Grade 2 Life Sciences)

#### Activities we did

- » We acted out the life cycle of a butterfly.
- » We examined various butterfly specimens and photos of host plants for caterpillars. We talked about how many caterpillars depend on specific types of plants for food, but when they become butterflies they often feed on other types of plants.
- » We looked at a monarch specimen and learned about the long migration monarchs undertake.

## **Today's craft: Butterfly Life Cycle Mobile**

#### You will need:

- » Butterfly life cycle template (included)
- » Cardstock
- » Colored pencils or crayons
- » Scissors

- » Paper plate
- » Hole puncher
- » Yarn (8 pieces about 20 inches (51 cm) long)



#### Directions:

- 1. Print out the butterfly life cycle template on cardstock.
- 2. Color in the stages of the life cycle and then cut each one out, leaving a border around them.
- 3. Decorate the paper plate with flowers if you want.
- 4. Punch a hole in the top of each of the stages of the life cycle and punch four holes at different points around the edge of the paper plate.
- 5. Attach the stages of the life cycle to the paper plate using the yarn. Attach a second piece of yarn to each hole on the paper plate and then join the four pieces at the top and tie a knot.






