Dolphins

Learning outcomes

- » Students know that organisms reproduce offspring of their own kind and that the offspring resemble their parents and one another. (Grade 2 – Life Sciences)
- » Students know sound is made by vibrating objects and can be described by its pitch and volume. (Grade 2 Life Sciences)
- » Describe the relative position of objects by using two references (e.g., above and next to, below and left of). (Grade 1 Investigation and Experimentation)

Activities we did


 We learned about how dolphins communicate and did some echolocation activities where we acted like dolphins.
We listened to the sounds other marine animals make and identified which animals were making certain sounds.

Today's craft: Leaping Dolphin

You will need:

- » Ocean and dolphin templates (included)
- » Cardstock
- » X-Acto knife
- » Scissors
- » Scotch Tape
- » Black marker

- » Gray plastic tablecloth
- » Pencil
- » Elmer's glue
- » Craft stick
- » Caryons or colored pencils



Directions:

- 1. Print out the ocean template on cardstock. Have an adult cut along the dotted line using an X-Acto or craft knife to make a slit.
- 2. Print out the dolphin on cardstock. Trace around the dolphin on the plastic tablecloth and cut it out.
- 3. Glue the tablecloth dolphin on the cardstock dolphin. Draw on an eye with the marker. Tape the craft stick to the back of the dolphin.
- 4. Color the ocean. You can draw other sea creatures in the water, too.
- 5. Stick the dolphin through the slit and make it leap and swim.
