Ostriches

Learning outcomes

» Students know stories sometimes give plants and animals attributes they do not really have. (Kindergarten – Life Sciences)

» Students know different plants and animals inhabit different kinds of environments and have external features that help them thrive in different kinds of places. (Grade 1 – Life Sciences)

» Students know that some kinds of organisms that once lived on Earth have completely disappeared and that some of those resembled others that are alive today. (Grade 3 – Life Sciences)

Why Can't I Fly? by Ken Brown How the Ostrich Got Its Long Neck retold by Verna Aardema

Activities we did

- » We learned that the connection between ostriches and earthquakes is plate tectonics.
- » We examined ostrich specimens and compared them to specimens from other birds to learn about what characteristics prevent ostriches from flying.
- » We explored other adaptations that ostriches have besides flying to help them escape predators.
- » We compared and contrasted ostrich and chicken eggs and talked about how ostriches care for their young.

Today's craft: Hatching Ostrich



You will need:

- » Egg and ostrich chick templates (included)
- » Cardstock
- » Tan construction paper
- » Scissors

- » Pencil
- » Hole puncher
- » Brass fastener
- » Crayons
- » Glue

Directions:

- 1. Print out the egg and ostrich chick templates on cardstock.
- 2. Cut out the egg and punch holes at the dots with the hole puncher. Put a brass fastener through the hole to attach the two egg parts.
- 3. Cut out the ostrich chick. Trace it on the construction paper and cut it out.
- 4. Color your ostrich and glue it to the bottom of the egg so that its head and neck are peeking out.
